# A Service of Thanksgiving on the 450<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Queen Elizabeth's School, Barnet



Friday 24<sup>th</sup> March 2023 Noon

#### THE SCHOOL

On this very day in 1573, Queen Elizabeth I granted a Charter brought by Robert Dudley, Earl of Leicester, for 'the establishment of the Free Grammar School of Queen Elizabeth in Barnet'. It is both fitting and an honour that we can celebrate the significant milestone of Queen Elizabeth's School's 450th anniversary in the place where Elizabeth I was crowned.

In its early years, QE carefully forged a path as a market-town grammar school, educating both day and boarding pupils in its schoolhouse, Tudor Hall, and successfully overcoming challenges such as a three-year outbreak of plague that started in 1603. During the English Civil War and Protectorate, the Governors evinced loyalty to the Crown, with several sent to the Tower. Finances were a perennial concern, and on occasion the school had to have recourse to the generosity of the Governors to stay afloat. In 1637, these pressures were somewhat eased when the Governing Body construed a provision in the Charter requiring the free tuition of local boys as applicable only to poor boys. The number of pupils with subsidised places was limited; the ranks of those paying tuition fees increased.

As Britain rose to become a major international trading power in the late 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> centuries, the Governors modernised the curriculum, introducing new subjects, taught in English, that would better prepare boys for burgeoning opportunities in commerce, the professions, and public service.

In the 300<sup>th</sup> anniversary year of 1873, at a time of national education reforms, Queen Victoria approved a plan for QE to become a state-funded suburban day school and to offer an increasing number of free places based on performance in an entrance examination.

By the 1920s, the school was outgrowing its Wood Street site, so a new campus was constructed in Queen's Road and opened in 1932 by Prince George. The site sustained damage during an air raid in 1941. Many Elizabethans served in the two world wars, with 113 paying the ultimate price. During the 1950s and 1960s, the school continued to grow. In September 1971, under a borough-wide education plan, QE joined the comprehensive school movement, a change that brought with it a doubling of the intake. Within a few years, however, the roll had fallen sharply, and Barnet Council was eyeing QE's closure. Under Eamonn Harris, Headmaster from 1984, the school's reputation recovered. He took advantage of new legislation to break free from local authority control and to reintroduce, in 1994, academic selection.

Over subsequent decades, QE has risen to fresh heights. There have been extensive new facilities, supported by contributions from parents and others. Traditions of service are maintained through programmes such as peer mentoring and local voluntary service. And an unwavering focus on academic performance has placed the school at the top of examination league tables. QE was the 2022 Sunday Times State Secondary School of the Year, while 2023 has seen a record 47 offers of places from Oxford and Cambridge.

Today's service reflects the school's long path from ancient to modern: from our Tudor foundations, represented by our Charter and by music from the reign of Elizabeth I, through to the school of today, seen in the reading of a new poem and the premiere of the anniversary anthem which the school commissioned from Howard Goodall.

Inspired by our long history, enjoying success in the present, and looking with hope toward the future, Queen Elizabeth's School is thriving from ancient roots.
